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Latitude + Climate = Classic Wines

Like the famous European vineyards of Burgundy, Champagne and Germany, New York is considered a cool climate wine area — even though New York's wine country is further south than those regions, as well as Washington State, and on a similar latitude to Oregon and parts of northern California.

The receding glaciers of the Ice Age left New York with a unique combination of geography and climate. Bodies of water (lakes, rivers and ocean) act as natural air conditioning, cooling in the summer, warming in the winter, and sheltering the vines from temperature extremes.

The result is five major wine regions (each with its own unique micro-climate) that grow more than 35 different varieties of grapes and make some of the finest wines in the world.

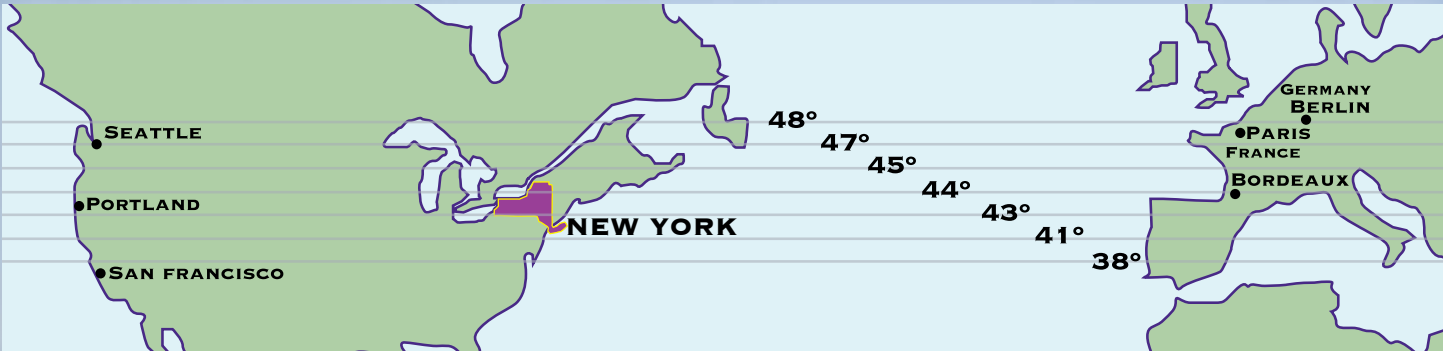

Your Guide to New York Wineries

Compared to Europe's wine regions, New York Wine Country is huge, spanning some 500 miles (800 km) from eastern Long Island to the state's western border with Pennsylvania. This guide is a general overview of the State's wine industry, and also includes an alphabetical listing of wineries by region, including contact information. For more detailed information, please visit us online at www.newyorkwines.org.

Most New York wineries welcome tourists during normal business hours year round, and many of them host special celebrations. A typical winery tour might include a visit to the vineyard, a stroll through the cellars, a guided wine-tasting, and an opportunity to buy wines and other gift items. You may want

to call ahead to find out about their tour hours, special events and other information.

In this guide, you'll also find:

- descriptions of our wine regions;
- a listing of our many fine grape varieties;
- handy tips on wine touring, tasting; serving and storing;

Enjoy your New York Wine experience. Remember to have fun safely. Always travel with a designated driver.

A note on Viticultural Areas:
The Federal Government's Department of the Treasury, Alcohol and Tobacco Tax and Trade Bureau designates "Viticultural Areas" similar to the "appellations of origin" in France, which may be used on wine labels and in advertising. New York State now has eleven viticultural areas, with three each on Long Island and in the Finger Lakes, along with Hudson River, Upper Hudson, Niagara Escarpment, Lake Erie, and Champlain Valley. While New York City and other areas are not designated viticultural areas, wine produced here can be labeled "New York State" wine as long as at least 75% of the grapes used were grown in New York.

Follow the Signs to the Wines



All across New York Wine Country, wineries and wine trails (groups of local wineries which jointly promote their region) invite you to wine tastings, wine and food feasts, seasonal celebrations and other unique events.

Follow the wine signs for a day trip, a weekend adventure or a memorable vacation. Enjoy wine country responsibly: Be sure to select a designated driver and travel safely!



Some Tips on Wine Touring

- Pick a designated non-drinking driver for the day.
- Don't rush your tour. A visit to 1 or 2 wineries in the morning, 1 for lunch, 2 or 3 in the afternoon is ideal.
- Taste responsibly – it's perfectly OK to spit out or “dump” a wine, even if you like it, and don't forget to snack between visits.
- Avoid wearing perfume, aftershave or sunscreen. It will affect the wine's bouquet. And for the sake of taste, don't chew gum, use mints or cough drops.
- Please be patient when entering a crowded tasting room. The staff will do their best to serve you as soon as they can.
- If you don't know the difference between wine varieties, don't be afraid to ask. Winemakers and tasting room staff are happy to explain.
- Pack a notebook to record the wines you especially like.
- When you find a wine you like, buy several bottles. Bring a cooler or wrap them up in newspaper so they don't overheat in your car during summer.

• Tour hours may vary from one winery to the next, so call ahead or check your wine trail brochure. If you're traveling in a group of 15 or more, you'll need to schedule your tour.

• Bring some ID. Winery staff will check if you look under 21.

What's the Best Wine? (Hint: The wine you like best!)

What's the best wine? Many people ask that question. The answer is simple: The best wine is the wine you like best.

And when it comes to New York wines, there's a lot to like. The New York wine industry makes more varieties of wines than almost any wine region in the world, offering something to please every taste and budget. Native American varieties, technically known as *vitis labrusca*, were the only grapes grown in New York until the 1930's. These hardy, productive varieties like Concord (red), Catawba (pink), and Niagara (white) translate into wines with a pronounced grapey aroma and taste that many people prefer.

French-American varieties, mostly developed by French scientists about 100 years ago, combine the best of both worlds — the flavor characteristics of European wines and the hardiness of

American vines. Baco Noir (red) and Seyval Blanc (white) are two examples. More recently, Cornell University's Geneva Experiment Station has developed several popular varieties such as Noiret, Traminette, and Valvin Muscat.

European varieties (*vitis vinifera*) — such as Riesling and Merlot — are the most recent additions to New York's viticultural repertoire, due primarily to the vision and persistence of the late Dr. Konstantin Frank. Bucking the conventional wisdom that these delicate varieties could not be grown in the Finger Lakes, Dr. Frank dramatically proved that they could, and in the process started the “vinifera revolution”, which spread beyond the Finger Lakes and New York to other eastern states.

So what's the best wine? You decide. Quality is not a function of the type of grape, but rather how well it's grown and transformed into wine. Many New York wines of all types have achieved world-class status, winning Double Gold and Gold medals in international competitions. So it's really a matter of YOUR taste. The best way to discover your favorites is to visit several wineries and taste a range of wines. In the meantime, the “New York's Great Grapes” section will give you an idea of what to expect.

Tips on Tasting

You don't have to be a gourmet to enjoy food. And you don't have to be a connoisseur to enjoy wine. All you need to know is what you like, and the best way to find that out is to visit several New York wineries and taste the fine varieties they have to offer.

There are three main types of wine. Sparkling wines are usually white and quite dry (not sweet). Table wines are available in white, red or rosé (pink), and they vary from very dry to sweet. Very sweet late harvest or ice wines, and fortified wines like ports and sherries, are called Dessert wines.



Wine Tasting: The 6-S Technique

Even though it's called "wine tasting", sampling wines is actually a feast for all the senses.

Just follow the S's:



1. See: Golden yellow, deep purple, salmon... admire a wine's color first by holding your glass up to the light.



2. Smell: Swirl the wine in your glass, then inhale the aroma (from the grapes) and the bouquet (from the wine-making process). See if you can make out subtle hints of other familiar smells – like apples, citrus, even chocolate!



3. Sip: Take a small sip, roll it around in your mouth and breathe in a little

air to release the aroma. Notice the texture – how it feels in your mouth. Is it light and refreshing or full and robust?

4. Spit or Swallow: If you're sampling several wines, don't be shy about spitting them out. It's quite acceptable, and most wine tasting rooms will have a bucket for that purpose. Go ahead and swallow if you're not driving or you're only tasting a few wines. Just remember not to overdo it.

5. Savor: Quality wines have a "finish" – a pleasant taste that stays with you after you've had a sip. It's the second-last step in the wine-tasting experience.

6. Santé: The traditional French toast (meaning "to your health") and the clinking of glasses ends off your tasting with sounds to please the ears.



Storing and Serving Wine

• Aging — Most wines don't need to be aged to be enjoyed. Winemakers will not "release" a wine until it's ready to drink – so if you can buy it, you can drink it.

• Storing — You don't need a fancy wine cellar. Just store your wine bottles on their side in a cool place with a steady temperature. Opened, re-corked or re-frigerated wine will last for several days.

• Temperature — Remember two simple formulas: 45-55-65 and 3-2-1. Chill sparkling wines and champagnes to about 45°F/7°C (3 hours in the fridge) before serving. Chill white and blush table wines, late harvest and ice wines to

about 55° F/13° C (2 hours in the fridge). Serve red wines, ports and sherries at cool room temperature — about 65° F/18° C. (If the room isn't too cool, re-frigerate for 1 hour.)

• Opening — Open white and sparkling wines when you're ready to serve them. Red wines may be opened well before serving to allow them to "breathe" (mix with air for full flavor and aroma). Be careful with sparkling wines and champagnes. Never shake the bottle or point it at another person. Holding the bottle in one hand and the cork in the other, twist the bottle while you apply downward pressure on the cork until you

feel a gentle pop.

• Glasses — You don't really need fancy glasses to enjoy wine, but you might want to invest in an all-purpose "everyday" set that works for all types. (Just make sure they hold at least 8 oz. of wine.) If you're more serious about wine-drinking, you can use the illustration on the bottom as a guide.

• Pouring — To fully enjoy the aroma of a red, white or dessert wine, fill glasses only about half-way. Sparkling wines can be filled almost to the brim.



Wine Glasses:

1. All purpose – Catawba shown here, but glass is suitable for all types of wine.
2. "Flute"- sparkling wines or champagne.
3. Bordeaux style reds – Cabernet Sauvignon, Cabernet Franc, Merlot, Chancellor.
4. Pinot Noir, Baco Noir.
5. Lighter whites – Riesling, Sauvignon Blanc, Seyval Blanc, Niagara.
6. Dessert Glass – Late harvest and ice wines.

Great Wines are Made From New York's Great Grapes

New York Varieties

"Varietal" wines are named after the main grape variety used, such as Seyval Blanc or Cabernet Franc. To have a varietal label, at least 75% of the grapes must be of that variety.

The listing of white and red wines below includes a brief description of aroma and taste characteristics, and suggestions on food pairings.

A note on price: How much a bottle of wine costs reflects both the costs of producing the grapes and overall consumer demand.

CABERNET FRANC



In Bordeaux, primarily a blending grape adding spiciness and pepper. Quite possibly the most promising red vinifera variety for New York. Very versatile "food wine" complementing a wide range of cheeses and meats, particularly lamb and beef recipes like steak au poivre.

CABERNET SAUVIGNON



The dominant grape in most Bordeaux wines, requiring a long growing season. Most New York plantings on Long Island. Big, bold red, often softened with some Merlot and spiced up with Cabernet Franc. Cabernet Sauvignon requires both age and strongly flavored foods to avoid being overpowering.

CATAWBA



May be made into pink (rosé or blush) or white wine depending on skin contact. Typically with both high sugar and high acid, lending a nice balance of sweetness and tartness like a ripe apple. Good sipping wine and complement to light cheeses and fruits.

CAYUGA WHITE



Developed by Cornell, a highly reliable and productive grape variety in terms of crop size and quality. Riesling-like aromas of apples, peaches, pears. Semi-dry taste makes for excellent sipping wine. Great with mild cheeses, fruit, delicate chicken or fish dishes.

CHARDONNAY



A very popular varietal wine in U.S., New York Chardonnays are generally more like French Chablis (crisp, light, acidic) than California (big, round, oaky). Typical aromas may include apples, melons, tropical fruit, or butter. Mouth-filling taste and texture allows pairing with many medium-flavored foods. Great with lobster — a match made in heaven.

CONCORD



The grape behind Welch's grape juice, this variety is also used in many kosher wines as well as some non-kosher wines. Fruity, aromatic, and mouth-filling, it's

best served very cold — with dessert or by itself.

DIAMOND



Somewhat similar to Delaware, Diamond adds a touch of spiciness to both the aroma and taste, making it a refreshing aperitif.

FRONTENAC



*Frontenac is a consistently heavy producer, with small, black berries in medium to large clusters. Frontenac's deep garnet color complements its distinctive cherry aroma and inviting palate of blackberry, black currant, and plum. This versatile grape can be made into a variety of wine styles, including rosé, red, and port.

GEWÜRZTRAMINER



German word "gewürz" means spice, an apt description of this wine most typically associated with Alsace, France. Aroma is perfumey, sometimes smelling of tropical fruits such as leech nuts. Medium bodied taste and mouthfeel. Great with Thanksgiving turkey, Asian and other foods with unusual spices.

LA CRESCENT



*La Crescent's intense nose of apricot, peach, and citrus lends itself to superior quality off-dry or sweet

white wines. Produced in a Germanic style, La Crescent wine is reminiscent of Vignoles or Riesling. The grape's high acidity provides good structure for excellent dessert or late-harvest style wines. Named after a French general (pronounced foshe), this variety can produce a simpler version of a Burgundy wine with a fruity bouquet, and is often used to make a "nouveau" wine just a couple months after harvest. Complements medium-flavored foods like roast pork.

LEMBERGER



Also known as Blaufränkisch, this winegrape is also used for blending with Cabernet Franc. Lemberger wines are typically rich and mellow, often with a dark chocolate/raspberry flavor, and pair well with lamb and other robust meats.

MARQUETTE



*Marquette is a cousin of Frontenac and grandson of Pinot noir. Viticulturally, Marquette is outstanding. Its open, orderly growth habit makes vine canopy management efficient. Finished wines are complex, with attractive ruby color, pronounced tannins, and desirable notes of cherry, berry, black pepper, and spice on both nose and palate.

MERLOT



A blending grape in Bordeaux to add softness and velvety texture, Merlot is the "signature" grape and wine of Long Island. Rich, full aroma may suggest raspberries, strawberries, or blackberries leading to mouth-filling flavors. Great with Long Island duck, lamb, and other robust foods.

NIAGARA



Another grape juice variety, Niagara's unique fruity aroma is like standing in the middle of a vineyard in late September. Taste is fruity and semi-dry. Serve very cold by itself, with light hors d'oeuvres, or dessert.

NOIRET



Developed by Cornell, Noiret ("nwahr – AY") is well suited to New York State's grape growing conditions, resulting in a distinctive red wine rich in color with aromas of pepper, blackberry, and some mint. Medium-bodied and long-lasting, Noiret is a very versatile "food wine" matching well with robust cheeses, tomato-based barbecue, and beef.

PINOT GRIS



(Pinot Grigio) With more fruit flavors and spiciness than Chardonnay but less intensity than Riesling, this relative of Pinot Noir makes wines that can offer a refreshing alternative to either. Pinot Gris has become more and more prevalent in New York tasting rooms over the past few years as wine drinkers come to appreciate this varietal that pairs well with food and also stands alone as an aperitif.

PINOT NOIR



The holy grail of grapes and wine. Most commonly associated with France's Burgundy region, Pinot Noir is very difficult to grow and vinify, yet several New York wineries are doing it very well. Pleasant, fruity aroma of cherries and strawberries. Light but mouth-filling taste. Very versatile with a range of medium foods including grilled salmon. Excellent choice for Thanksgiving.

RIESLING



The "signature" grape and wine of the Finger Lakes, Riesling is extremely versatile in its range of styles (from dry to lusciously sweet ice wines) and its pairings with foods. Aroma may suggest peaches, honey, flowers. Taste is crisp, refreshing. Great by itself or with light hors d'oeuvres, seafood, chicken, dessert; and as a counterpoint to spicy foods.

SAUVIGNON BLANC



A cousin of Cabernet Sauvignon, This green-skinned grape variety began its New York debut on Long Island but is now being grown in the Finger Lakes and other regions as well. The distinctive "grassy" aroma and crisp taste make Sauvignon Blanc an ideal pairing for raw oysters, other shellfish, and seafood in general.

SEYVAL BLANC



Primarily grown in the Finger Lakes and Hudson Valley, Seyval Blanc typically has aromas of apples, citrus and melons, and often resembles Sancerre from France's Loire region, though some barrel fermented versions resemble Fumé Blanc. Crisp, refreshing taste. Good complement to seafood and chicken dishes.

SYRAH



Originally from the Rhone region of France, this dark-skinned grape variety produces medium to full-bodied red wines. The high levels of tannin and acid allow the wines to age nicely, and this earthy and peppery wine pairs nicely with barbecued pork or chicken.

TRAMINETTE



Another Cornell creation from the grape breeding program, Traminette's most dominant parent is Gewürztraminer, as is immediately obvious by the spicy aroma. Compared with Gewürz, Traminette is an easy and reliable grape to grow and yields the same basic aroma and taste characteristics. Good Thanksgiving wine, and with spicy foods like Thai or Mexican.

VALVIN MUSCAT™



Developed by Cornell University, Valvin Muscat is a white grape producing wines with a unique aromatic character.

but still retaining the delicate floral notes associated with Muscat varieties. Valvin can work as a dry wine paired with all manner of cheeses, fruit and even spicy dishes, but can also lend itself to luscious dessert wines.

VIDAL BLANC



Sometimes resembling Riesling, the high acid of the grape usually requires some residual sugar for balance, and is characterized by a fruity aroma and delicate taste. Excellent grape for producing late harvest and ice wines for dessert.

VIGNOLES



A versatile grape like Riesling that can be made from dry to very sweet (late harvest style) with a great balance of

acidity. Citrus (especially grapefruit) notes in the aroma. Refreshing taste. Great with Mexican or Chinese foods.

New York Table Grapes

The major table grape variety is Concord, the beautiful blue-skinned grape with a unique aroma that is also used for most grape juice. Other Native American varieties marketed as table grapes include Catawba, Delaware and Niagara. Grapes for Your Health

Research indicates that no matter what your age or your favorite color, grape juice (purple or golden color) is good for you.

Ron Prior, PhD at the University of Arkansas, has done some research comparing the health benefits of various juices and has found that "Welch's purple 100% grape juice has far more antioxidant activity than commonly consumed fruit juices such as orange and apple juice, and more per serving than over 40 commonly consumed vegetables and fruits."

Other research has shown that "white" grape juice (actually yellow in color) is a great drink for infants — easier to digest and offering a higher level of desired components than other fruit juices.

For more mature members of the population, the cardiovascular system also benefits from regular

consumption of grape juice, and it also appears that regular consumption of grape juice may help prevent certain types of cancer.

Grape Juice Recipes

Make a Splash with New York Grape Juice

Purple Cow

2-3 small scoops vanilla ice cream
1 cup chilled sparkling New York red or purple grape juice
Scoop ice cream into a tall glass, pour in juice. Serve with straw or spoon.

Peyton's Party Punch

1 can of New York Purple Grape Juice Frozen Concentrate, thawed
2 liters lemon-lime soda, chilled
Raspberry Sherbet
In large punchbowl combine grape juice concentrate and soda.
Spoon in desired amount of sherbet. Mix. Serve.

Fruit Wines and Meads

Grapes account for the vast majority of wines made in New York and elsewhere, but non-grape fruit wines and meads (honey wine) are becoming increasingly popular among both producers and consumers. At least 70 of New York's 400+ wine producers now make some fruit wine and/or mead, and consumers are often surprised that the wines are not overly sweet but rather well balanced with sugar and acid, and reminiscent of the fruit in both aroma and taste.

Apples, blackberries, blueberries, currants, peaches, pears, raspberries, strawberries... and yes, honey, too....New York produces all of these, so why not celebrate our riches?

It only makes sense to capture the fresh, luscious flavors of these other fruits and bring them to the consumer for one more way to enjoy the bounty that is New York Agriculture. Making wines of other fruits or honey also enables wineries to get more use out of the large investment they have in processing equipment, storage facilities and employees.

New York wines – regardless of the fruit they come from – are a treat for the senses and we hope you'll enjoy discovering the rainbow of colors and flavors created by your local producers.



New York Wine Country

New York is home to many distinctive wine regions, each with its own unique climate, scenery, character and wine varieties. About two hours from New York City lies the Long Island region, a laid-back maritime haven blessed with sunshine, sea and a long growing season. The historic Hudson River region, mid-way between New York City and Albany, features densely-forested hills dotted with elegant mansions overlooking the majestic Hudson River.

Further west in central New York the picturesque Finger Lakes region, with its thin parallel lakes flanked by steep hillsides, hosts almost half of New York's wineries. And flanking Buffalo you'll find wineries in the Niagara Escarpment and the Lake Erie regions – grape juice country and home to the Concord Grape Belt Heritage Association. New York Winery Listings and Maps by Region

Life in New York's wine industry is exciting... and part of the excitement comes from the fact that it is expanding so rapidly that it makes keeping a list-ing like this up to date a difficult task.

We list all wineries and their Satellite stores or Branch offices, and wineries-to-be – those that will be opening soon – that we can find information for on the State Liquor Authority web listing. In addition to the wineries listed, we have also heard about a few others that will be coming along soon, or may be producing wine, but not necessarily hosting visitors just yet. They are marked with an *.

There are also wineries that have Satellite Stores or a tasting room facility which is not located at their production location. These stores are often located in an area which makes it easy for visitors

to sample and buy wines, even though you can't actually see the vineyards or the winery. These locations are indicated by the words: (Satellite Store).

There are also winery licenses for several production facilities which do not host visitors. These listings are not included here, nor are they included in the winery counts.

Growth in the New York wine industry is very exciting and happening everywhere. Since many of our wineries are outside the official wine regions, and not necessarily very close to each other, we're grouping them in general areas and then within those areas providing the city name from their address so you can plot their location and plan your trip. Have a great time discovering New York wines wherever you go!

Long Island: The New Classics

Long Island, with its sandy soil and moderate climate, is best known for its superb reds — classic Bordeaux blends (called “Meritage” wines in the U.S.), Cabernet Sauvignon and Merlot.

At the city of Riverhead, Long Island splits into two forks, separated by Great Peconic Bay. Most of the region’s wineries are located on the north fork, with the remaining 4 on the south fork, better known as The Hamptons.

New York City Area: Where It All Began

Few people know that Manhattan was the first place in New York State to plant grapes for wine-making. Back in the mid 1600's, Dutch settlers brought vinifera grape stock from Europe. The vines didn't survive, but later plantings managed to flourish elsewhere in the state. Eventually it was discovered that vinifera canes could be grafted onto native rootstock, making it possible for New York's wineries to produce unique varieties that mirror the city's cultural diversity. While most of the wineries listed here are not open for tours, you should look for their products at your favorite retailer.

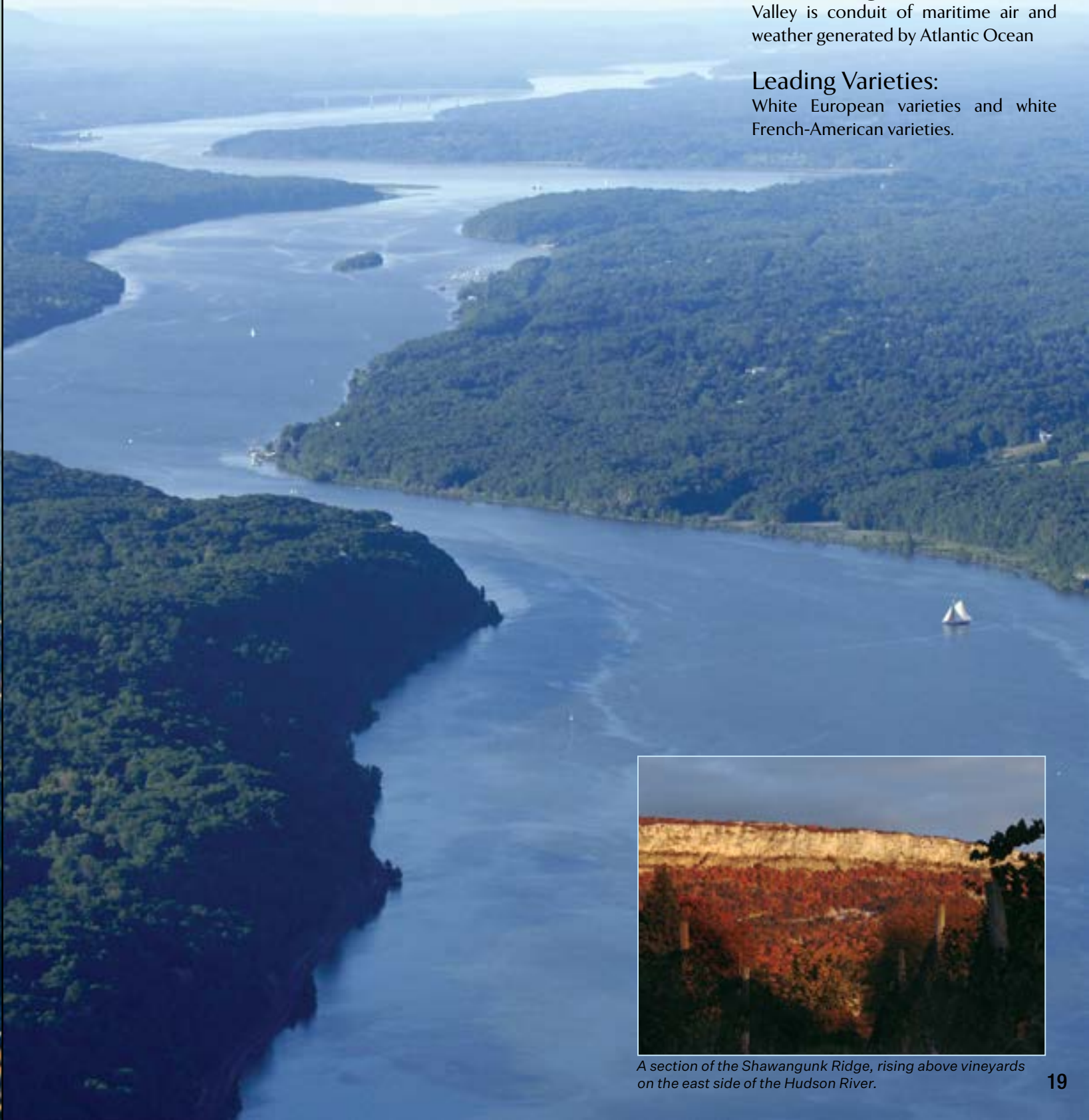

Finger Lakes: Wine Varieties Second to None

Located in the heart of New York's scenic Finger Lakes region, the Finger Lakes wine country is centered around four main lakes with Native American names: Canandaigua ("The Chosen Spot" or "The Chosen Place"), Keuka ("Canoe Landing" or "Crooked Lake"), Seneca ("Place of the Stone"), and Cayuga ("Boat Landing") (with the latter two also recognized as separate viticultural areas due to their unique grape-growing conditions).

Some of the newest growth in this region, however, is coming around the "Little

Lakes" – Conesus ("Always Beautiful") and Hemlock (the only lake named by European settlers) found in the west. The smaller lakes in the east - Owasco ("Floating Bridge" or "Crossing Place") and Skaneateles ("Long Lake") are also seeing wineries open in their vicinity.

This region specializes in Sparkling Wines, Riesling, Pinot Noir, and Ice Wine, and is also known for its Chardonnay, and Cabernet Franc as well as several French-American and Native American varietals.

Also known as Chautauqua, the Lake Erie region is the largest grape-growing region outside of California, with some 20,000 acres of vineyards, major processing plants and the headquarters of the National Grape Cooperative Association (which owns Welch's Foods). Although about 95% of its grapes are Concord, primarily used for grape juice,

the region also grows French-American and European wine grape varieties that are made into fine wines.

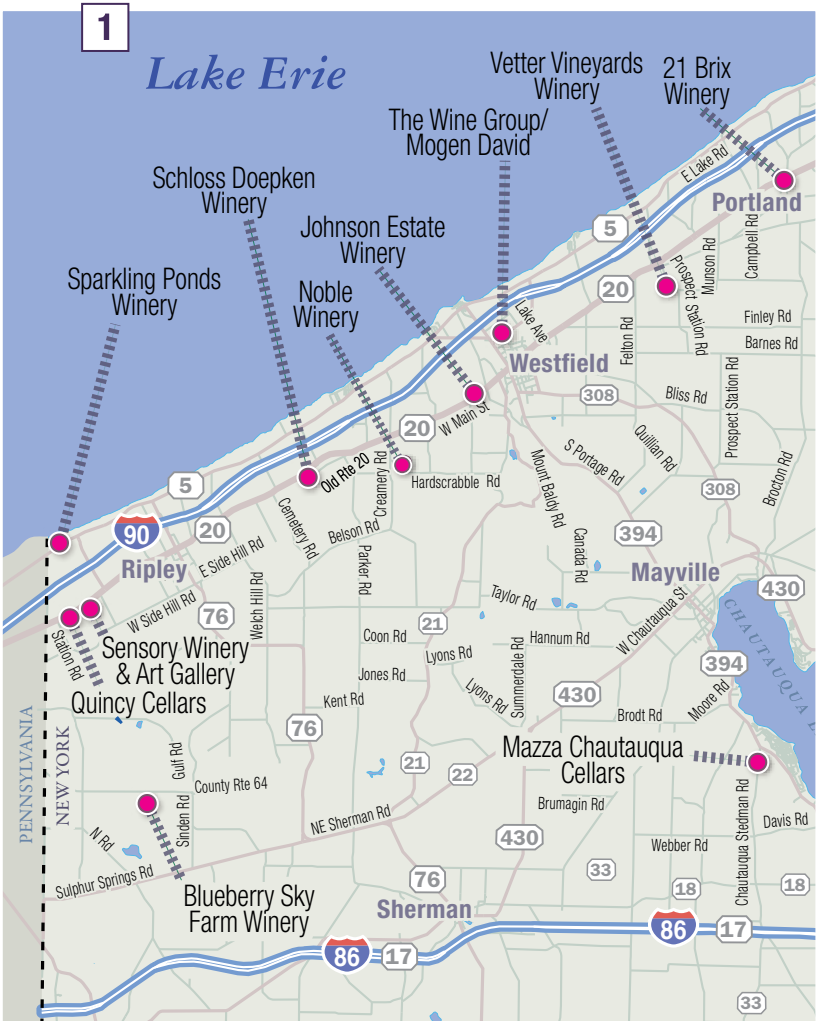
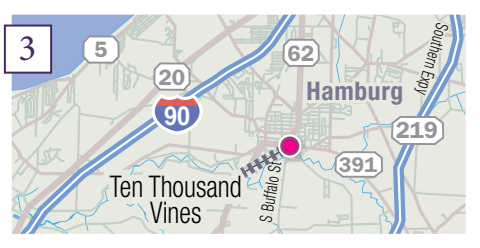
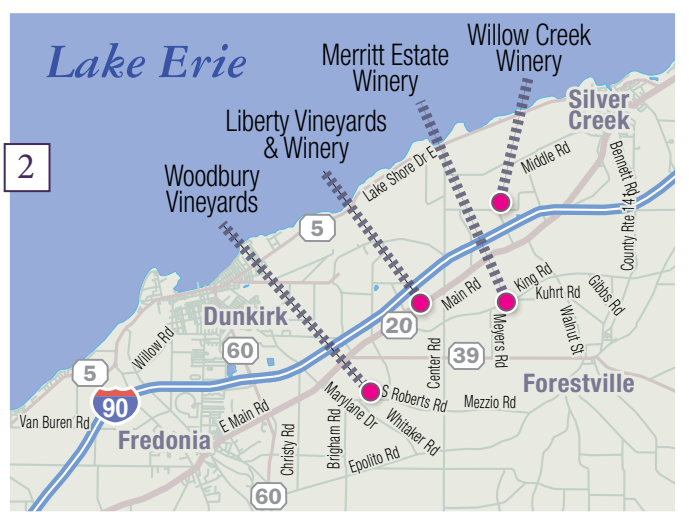

Niagara Escarpment & Greater Niagara Area: Wine Region of Unique Splendor

The geography of the Niagara Escarpment and surrounding area have a unique climate that is one of the warmest in New York State due to proximity to the Great Lakes and the escarpment itself, which traps warm air currents from Lake Ontario. The dolomitic limestone soil of the Escarpment and the gravel silts near the lakeshore, along with a moderate climate, are ideal for growing grapes and a wide variety of fruit. The Niagara Escarpment was officially recognized as an American

Viticultural Area (AVA) in 2005 and the larger “Greater Niagara” region is one of the fastest growing wine regions in the nation.

The word is out—New York wines are competing with some of the finest wines the world has to offer – and winning their share of gold! In 2015, New York wines garnered 128 Double Gold, 726 Gold, and 128 Best of Class awards and above in various competitions around the country.

The fact is, New York wineries continue to earn gold, silver and bronze medals in major national and international competitions year after year. And once the wines have won their gold medals, many go on to succeed in the higher levels of competition, coming home with Best of Show for the competition, their class and/or category.

Of course the winners in these competitions come head to head in the New York Wine & Food Classic, known as “The Oscars for New York Wine.” The Classic is held in August every year and the competition is fierce to see who will have the right to claim the Governor’s Cup. And the important thing to note is that New York wines are winning in all categories. Rieslings and sparklers always do well, but there is nothing quite as exciting as a gold medal for a red wine or for a New York French-American or Native American varietal in a California competition.

Competitions are a great way for a winery or an industry to spread the word about the quality of product they have, but it is important to note that not all wineries enter competitions, so their absence on a list of winners doesn’t indicate that they don’t make wonderful wine. As has been said several times already, the best wine is the wine you like best and it really doesn’t matter what the judges say when you are buying for your personal enjoyment.

In addition to formal wine competitions, there are several influential consumer wine publications which are increasingly recognizing the quality of New York wines.

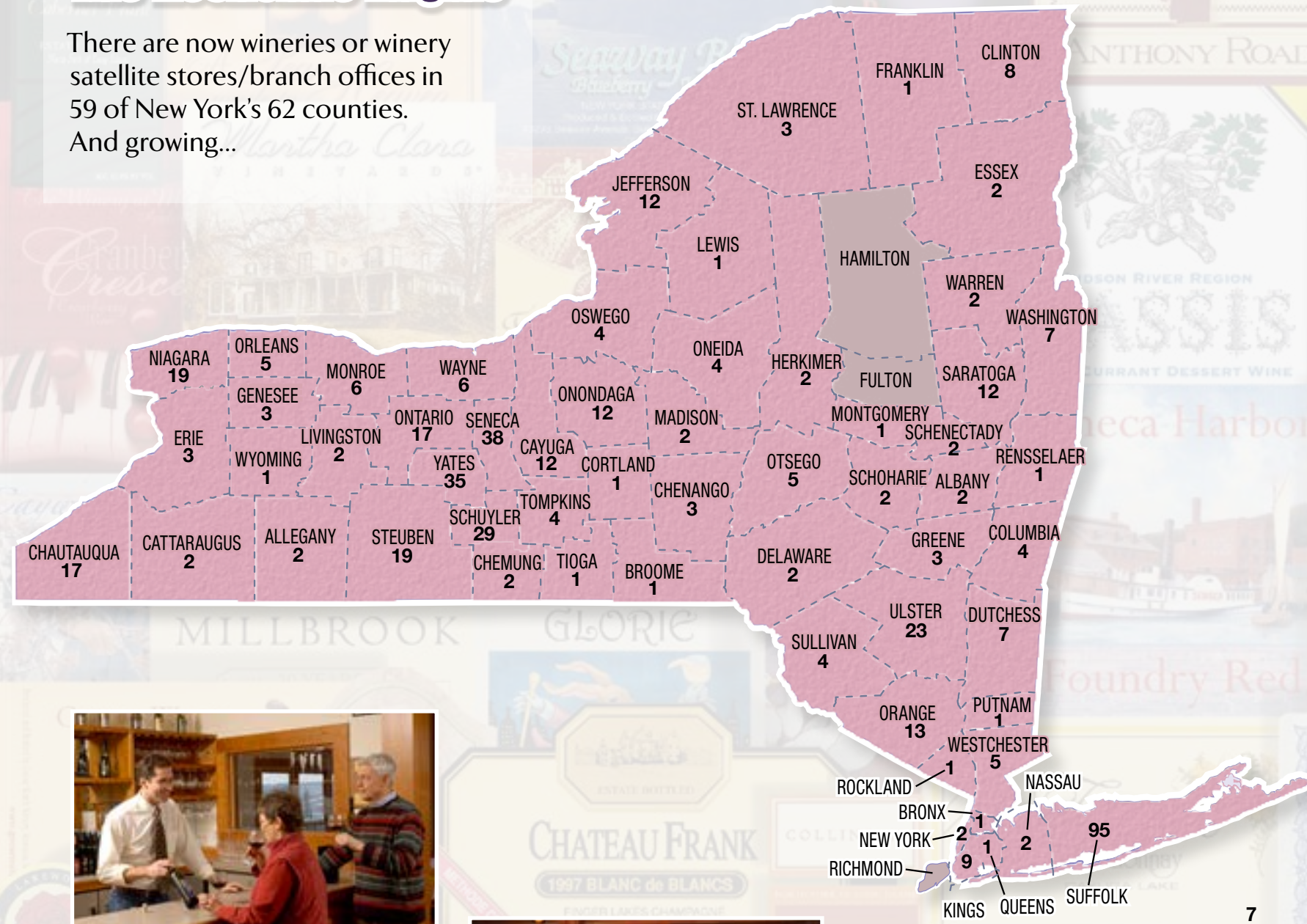
New York Wine Industry Growth Summary

- A 2008 government survey by the National Agricultural Statistical Service, similar to previous ones from 2004, 2000 and 1998, shows accelerating wine industry growth since creation of the New York Wine & Grape Foundation in 1985.
- In the years since 1975, the number of New York wineries has multiplied 19-fold from 21 to 401 with 353 (88%) established since 1985 when the New York Wine & Grape Foundation was established. 133 wineries have opened since 2011.
- From 2001 to 2014, 281 new wineries opened – more than the previous 170 years – and in just eight years from 2007-2014, the 207 new wineries exceeded the total from the 20 year period of 1980-1999, more than quadrupling the growth rate.
- Wine production has increased by over 50% since 1985 to about 175,000,000 bottles annually.
- The number of tourist visits to wineries has multiplied 13-fold since 1985 from 384,000 to 4,986,000 in 2008 and 5.29 million in 2012, with a significant share from other states.
- Between 2000 and 2008, tourist visits increased by 85% and per person spending by 76%, for a total increase of 228% in the value of sales (and sales taxes for the state and local governments). The number of tourist visits and sales has increased significantly since then.
- In 2008 the sales tax collected on sales at wineries exceeded \$4.85 million for the State and \$3.63 million for localities, up 605% since 1995. Excise and sales taxes have also increased significantly since then.
- The average winery invested \$500,000 between 2000 and 2003 (and \$400,000 during 2006-2008) in vineyards, wine production, tasting room, and other facilities, supporting many other economic sectors.

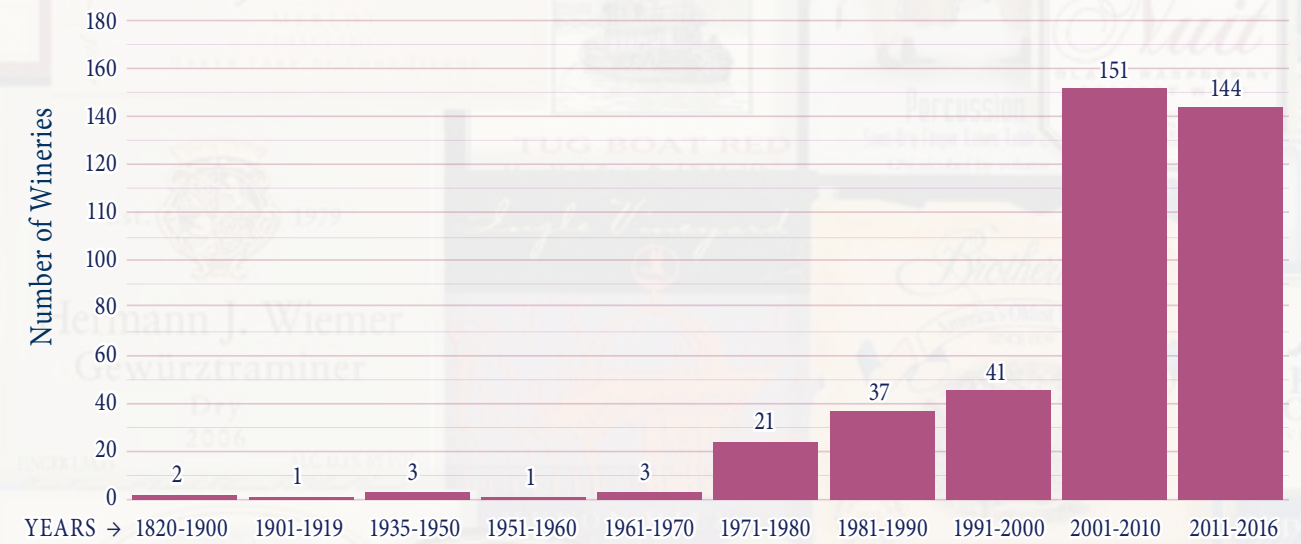

There are now wineries or winery satellite stores/branch offices in 59 of New York's 62 counties. And growing...



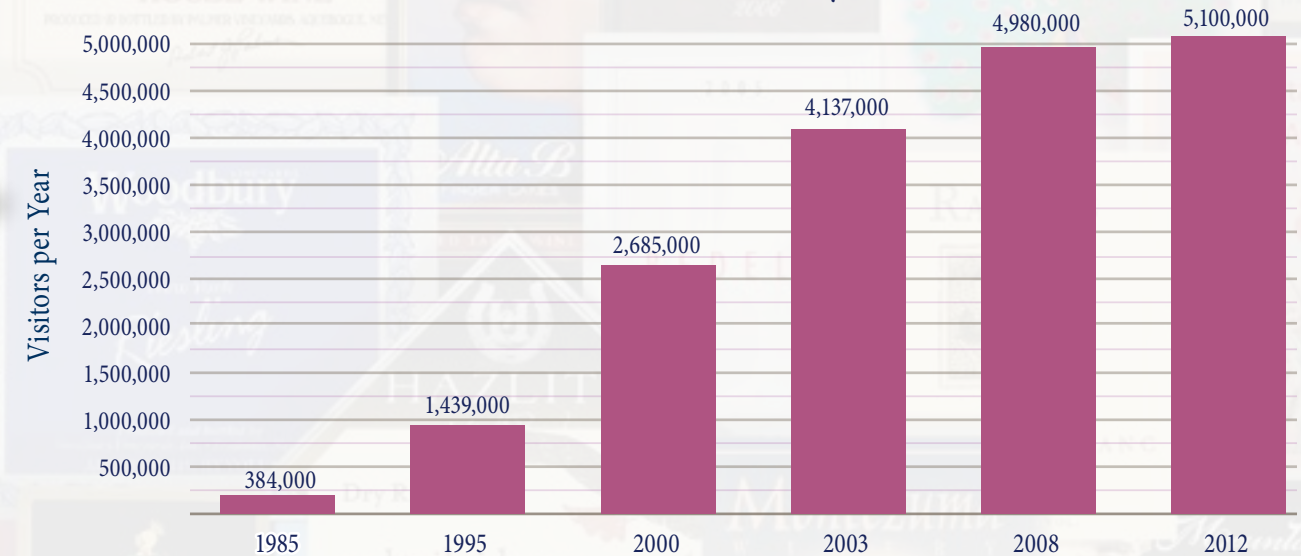
Wineries – Years Established



The Farm Winery Act of 1976 and creation of the New York Wine & Grape Foundation in 1985 both stimulated wine industry growth. From 2001 to 2010, 156 new wineries opened – more than in the previous

170 years – and in just five years from 2005-2009 110 new wineries exceeded the total from the 20 year period of 1980-1999, essentially quadrupling the growth rate.

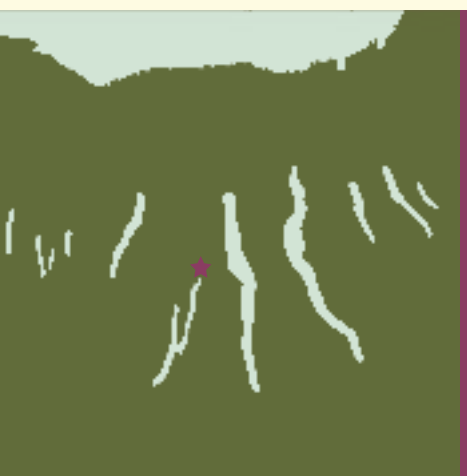
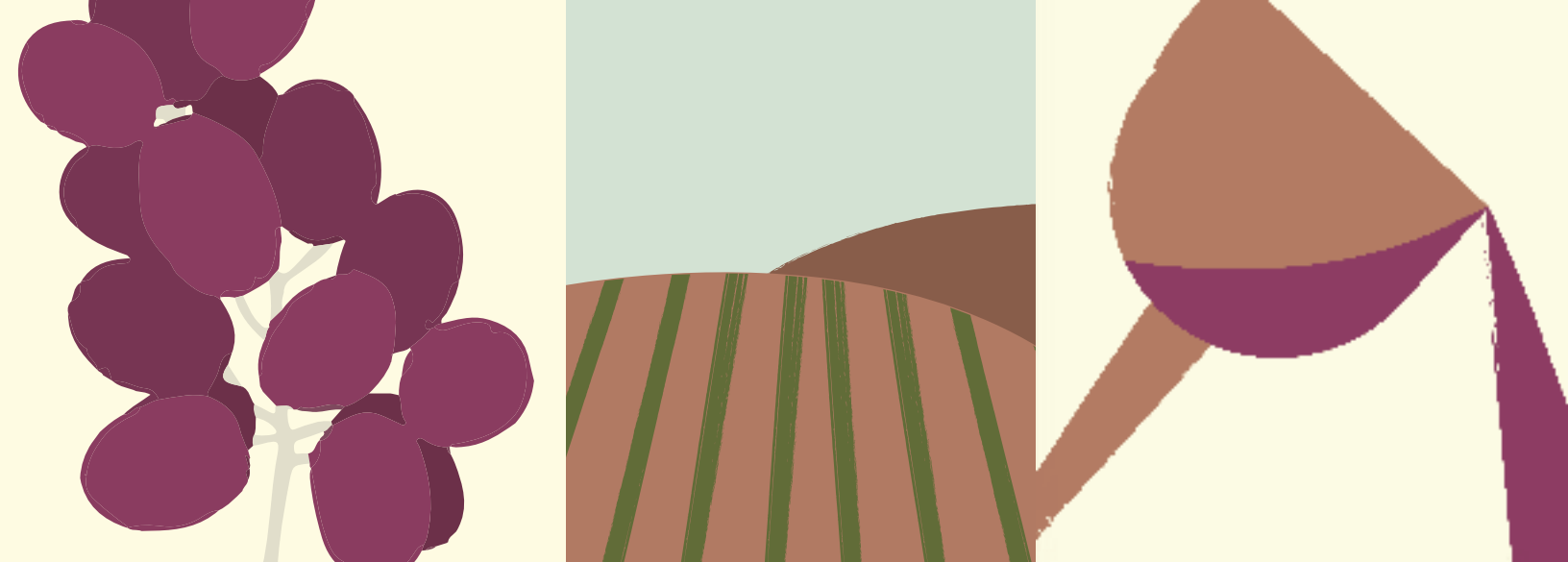
